John Lee Southall, son of the late John and Mary Southall, was born on March 27, 1929 in Portsmouth, Virginia. After a brief illness, he departed this life on December 20, 2020. His early education was in public schools in Portsmouth, Virginia. He loved his family and sought out an opportunity for learning and development by joining the United States Air Force where he served his country. After his military service, he went on to earn advanced degrees at Morgan State University and a MBA at Atlanta University. Lovingly known as “Dr. Southall” by his colleagues and students, John had a passion for education and teaching Business Law. He served over 42 years as a tenured professor at Morgan State University’s School of Business Administration where he made countless friends and inspired generations of students before retiring. He was determined to make a difference by using his god given ability to teach. In his early teaching years, he taught incarcerated youth college courses in a program to help them earn a college degree at Patuxent Institution in Jessup, MD. John was an avid reader, writer, and motivational speaker. He set a tremendous example for his peers and family by being a lifetime learner. Shortly after his retirement in 2019, he earned his real estate and insurance license and continued to mentor junior professors. He was married to the late Betty F. Southall for over 25 years and resided in Baltimore, Maryland for more than 50 years where they raised their 3 children: Noriyuki, Christina, and Romonda. He loved all

his kids so much. His baby boy, Noriyuki, was his groomed protégé.

“Uncle John,” as he was affectionately called, loved his family dearly. He was the patriarch of the family

and a God-fearing man who loved reading his bible. He gave his life to Christ and accepted Him as his

Lord and Savior. He loved the Lord with all of his heart and soul. He also instilled his love of God in his

family by leading the way each Sunday just down the street from their home to Christian Life Church

when his kids were young. He later joined his church family at New Shiloh Baptist Church where he

praised God at both service and Sunday school.

He was a natural social butterfly who loved spending time with his family and friends. He could make

friends anywhere and with anyone. He was known to write poetry, recite bible verses, and share “pearls

of wisdom” with his dearest friends and colleagues. John lived with the purpose of giving, sheltering

others, and loving God. He was very understanding, kind, generous, and his loyalty was steadfast. To his

family, he was the Dad, brother, and Uncle John who always loved unconditionally, was funny, hummed

songs, loved heckling during action movies or westerns, and demonstrated a respectful virtuous life.

To his friends and colleagues, he was a great support, helpful listener, and a confidant.

John was there

for so many people and always happy to lend a helping hand. He always had advice on rainy days.

He cherished and appreciated all that God gave him and protected it to a fault. Even until the sunset of

his life, he rose each day with a magnificent spiritual light ready to head out and start his day with the

purpose to accomplish something, help someone, or take care of something. From sunrise to sunset,

John’s life was lived to the fullest, and he inspired greatness, pride, and humility. He was dutiful in all

things, humble, and a joyful giver who gave more than he ever asked.

I remember how they would talk endlessly about The Transformers, Mission Impossible and even Hunger Games. When “Black Panther” came out, he paid for several less fortunate children to see this inspiring movie in the theater, so that they would feel motivated. The success of the next generation was always on his mind.

Whenever he joined us for lunch or dinner, we would have him sit at the head of the table, and he would say grace and those meals were always special. He was well read and enjoyed reading, learning, and meeting people from all walks of life. He spoke with conviction and people enjoyed listening to him. I remember the day that my sister Anjali and her husband Matthew met him. They were so impressed. Dr. Southall was always encouraging, and patient. I never saw him get wound up; he would take everything with a stride, and he never once complained. Dr. John Southall touched countless lives, and I know that he was family to more than me.
