triplets, her great granddaughters. Agnes Jenkins retired from Montebello State Hospital. She continued working part time at Kernan Hospital until her death. She was also a member of the NAACP and the retired chapter of AFMCE. She leaves to cherish her memories: her son, George Douglas Jenkins; her devoted daughter-in-law, Bettie Jenkins; two granddaughters, Yolanda (Nikki) Henriques, Sholanda Jenkins; four great granddaughters, one sister, Louise Alston of Baltimore, MD; two brothers, John Jennings of Washington, DC and Wallace Jennings of Baltimore, MD; two aunts, Lenora Willis of Brooklyn, NY and Elizabeth (Flozy) Wilson of Jamaica, NY. Two devoted friends, Annie Bailey and Otha Smith; and a host of nieces, nephews, other relatives and friends.
