



Alice Street Hardaway

May 24, 1915 - February 28, 2013

On February 28, 2013 as day was slowly drawing to it's close, God called you from sleep to eternal rest, from "labor to reward."

Alice was born on May 24, 1915 in Nottoway County, Virginia to the late Junius and Burley Street. She was the middle of fifteen siblings.

Early in life, Alice accepted Christ and was baptized at the High Rock Baptist Church. She was faithful and loyal member until she married and moved to Baltimore.

Alice attended school in Prince Edward County, Virginia. While her parents and family labored diligently on their farm, Alice said, "Farm work is not for me." In fact, the main crop was tobacco. According to Alice, pulling tobacco made her ill. She was assigned the job of house cleaning and watching the food that her mother started. Alice was also supposed to "watch" the garden and ward off farm animals. On one occasion, as her father returned from the fields and found a cow in the garden, he inquired about this cow eating his garden. Alice responded, "I did not see the cow." Clearly, farm work was not for her. Her chores became condensed to the inside only.

Alice married young and started her family with daughter Bertha, the first of her three children. She resided in Richmond for a brief period of time. Alice

was later divorced and moved to Baltimore. She married the young man who had spied her when he was yet a child playing outside of the High Rock Baptist Church, Paul Hardaway. She and her husband were married for more than sixty years. To their union was born a son, Paul Hardaway, Jr., and a daughter, Patricia (Gail). Life became family centered.

During World War II, she was one of the famous Rosie the Riveters at the former Glenn L. Martin's now Martin's Marietta. While Alice was not a good farm worker, she was indeed quite ambitious.

Alice and Paul were long time faithful members of Mount Pleasant Baptist Church. As long as good strength and good health allowed, they enjoyed their church worship.

Alice was devoted to home and family. She fashioned and maintained a lovely home. Alice recalled her earlier acquired culinary skills. She demonstrated her cooking talents for birthdays and holidays.

Alice leaves to cherish her memory: daughters, Bertha Lewis and Patricia Gail Marshall and son Paul Hardaway Jr.; daughter-in-law, Fannie Hardaway and sons-in-law, Ellis Lewis and Willie Marshall Jr.; beloved grandchildren, Michael Lewis (Cheryl), Rene' Wilson (Phillip), Irving Lewis (Regina), Sheila Byrd, Paul Hardaway III, Kimberly Hardaway, David Marshall, Shawn Marshall, Katrina Hardaway and Bernard Marshall; nine great-grandchildren and two great-great grandchildren; one sister, Rosa Simms; nieces, nephews, other relatives and friends.
