Rain or shine every Sunday you could always expect some good fried chicken, greens and real potatoes along with whatever else that she had for dinner that Sunday. Everyone was made welcome whether you were family, friend or friend of a friend or somebody just dropping by. The grand finale of Sunday evening was everybody scrambling to get their baggie and filling it up with goodies from the server that was always filled with candy, cookies and fruit to take home for the week. Those days are truly missed.

Ann had one brother, Herbert Carroll, who preceded her in death.
