CARLA JOYCE GLOVER came into this world on May 2, 1947. She was the eldest daughter of the late Ruby Inez Jackson Glover and the late James W. Glover. Carla left this world unexpectedly in the early evening of Tuesday, March 20, 2018. However, Carla leaves so very much with all of us fortunate enough to have been recognized, befriended, loved or adored by her.

Carla is a proud product of the Baltimore City Public School System, and graduated from Edmondson High School where she excelled as a student and found a passion for music. She studied music, sang in choirs and participated in musicals produced in her high school. She often reflected on her time spent in high school as the most fun of her life. Carla furthered her education at Coppin State College where she earned a Bachelor's Degree in Education; met and married fellow student Marvin V.J. Logan; and in 1969, earned a Master's Degree in Special Education. From her union with Marvin Logan, Carla has two daughters, Milissa and Jeaneen, aka "Missy Miss" and "Jean Jean", the nicknames given to them by their Grandmother, Ruby Glover.

Our parents dedicated themselves to raising their young girls in a nurturing, loving home right in Northwest Baltimore on Glen Avenue. Carla, who has always been creative, was a dedicated mother and housewife. Our mother loved sewing matching outfits for her daughters, decorating their home, hosting parties, regularly exploring her cooking talent with a new and different

recipe, having fun with and instructing her daughters. Our parents always valued instructing their girls with academic lessons and the lessons of life. They emphasized education as much as values, like requiring Missy and Jeaneen to donate toys before getting new one for Christmas, and being the parents to raise money for a new playground at their daughters' elementary school during Marvin Logan's term as Parent Teacher Association President. When her girls were in elementary school, our mother embarked on what would become her approximately thirty-year career as a Baltimore City Public School Teacher specializing in teaching a special education curriculum to students of all levels.

Everyone that knew Carla knew or soon discovered how much she loved to teach. They knew it because of how often she recalled something one of her students said, or accomplished, or failed at or appreciated. She connected with her students. She cared about them. She was the teacher who bought a suit for a student's middle school graduation. She went to the parents when they didn't show up on Parent/Teacher Conference night. She asked questions. She spent hours thinking of ways to make a concept fun, and thereby make the most disinterested student curious. She did not want a child with a learning disability to be denied a proper and complete education.

She strived to expose them to as much of the world outside of Baltimore City as she possibly could. Through it all, she liked to have fun! The time and money she spent on bulletin boards was enormous, and the Halloween costumes were legendary. One year she dyed sheets in the bathtub, mixed the perfect shades of green, and made a crown out of who knows what, to teach her classes as the Statue of Liberty. It was that dedication that sets her apart to this day. And while she taught, she continued to raise her daughters, and nurture her love of music.

She was member of St. James Episcopal Church and sang with the choir for

years. She regularly went to the opera, the theater, and never stopped listening to music every available minute in between: classical, jazz, musical and movie soundtracks, R&B, soul, hip hop, rock, electronica.

Along with her career, her music, her creative outlets, Carla was fulfilled by and thrived on the love she shared with her children and her grandchildren Cori Paige and Taylor Jacob Sims. She was an ever present figure in their lives from birth to childhood, and the bond she had with each of them was sacred to her.

Our mother will be remembered for so many things, but most certainly for her laugh! That laugh that sounded like she had run out of breath. That laugh that made her clutch her heart. That laugh that made her kick her feet and make her run to the bathroom. She loved to laugh; she loved to make people laugh. Carla was a strong, good spirit. She could be tough when she needed to be. She prided herself on being independent and as strong willed as her Taurus psyche (and her beloved Grandmother, Inez Regina Edwards), and these are some of the qualities that make her truly memorable. Even as she confronted health-related challenges, the nurses, doctors, surgeons, and staff remember her for her fortitude, her optimism, and her laugh.
