On Tuesday evening October 29, 2013, God looked down upon the earth and called his humble servant CHARLES into his heavenly home. Charles was known to his family and friends as “Charlie” and “Pop-Pop”. He was the second born child of the late Richard Curtis and Alberta Jackson in Baltimore, Maryland on September 21, 1925. Charlie was reared in South Baltimore with his older brother Nathaniel (who preceded him in death). He completed his education in the Baltimore City Public School System and went on to receive a certificate in masonry. After completing his education Charles enlisted in the Navy. He served his country during World War II 1943-1946 and The Korean War 1950-1952. Following his tours in the Navy, Charles began his thirty-five year career at Giant Foods in Ingleside Shopping Center. Charlie’s superior dedication did not go unnoticed. He was awarded many accolades, for Great Customer Service and Outstanding Work Performance. He proudly retired in December 1995. Charles Sr. was a faithful servant of The Lord. He was baptized early in life. Charles initially fellowshipped with his family at Leadenhall Baptist Church in South Baltimore, but later joined Morning Star Baptist Church of Catonsville. He was a committed member and faithful tither until his passing. Mr. Jackson met and fell in love with his childhood sweetheart, Gertrude Rhodes. After a whirlwind courtship Gert and Charlie joined in holy matrimony in 1947. From this Union the Jacksons were blessed with six children. There are three sons, Khalif, Darryl, and Kevin; and there

were three daughters, Diane, Sheila, and Sharon (who preceded them in death). During this sixty-four year union Charles and Gertrude were an exemplary couple. They always displayed enduring love and parental devotion. Mr. Jackson was an excellent provider for his family. He wanted nothing but the best for them. He became the master builder to provide his family a better life. He relocated his wife and six children from West Baltimore to Catonsville. His masonry skills were used to build his family the perfect home at 101 Roberts Avenue in 1960. There were endless memories created in the home. Pop-Pop enjoyed some of the simple things in life. He was on cloud nine watching any of his favorite television shows. No matter if it was Days of Our Lives, Young and the Restless, Jeopardy, Price is Right, or Wheel of Fortune he was always in high spirits. Mr. Charles was also a true foodie. He was a connoisseur of Haagen-Daz Ice Cream (he couldn't get enough of it), Italian Food, and Soul Food. Quietly on Tuesday evening October 29th, at his home, Charles gained his independence and entered a place where the soul is safe and free to live with God through eternity.
