Charles Levi Nash was born in Richmond on October 9, 1945 to the late Norman L. Nash, Jr. and the late Margaret Fletcher Nash. He was the fourth of five children. Charles accepted Christ as his savior at an early age. He was a member of Bethany Baptist Church in Sandston, VA. As a youth, he was active in the Varina Fairfield Sunday School Union. He was active in the church throughout his life and was a trustee and treasurer of the church. Charles was united in holy matrimony with Goldie Verneil Gaines. Their union was blessed with two children, April and Thomas, and the love of his life, Alexander, his only grandchild. He worked as a manager at Kings Department Store and Zales. He was the first black magistrate of Henrico County, and held this position for more than twenty years. He performed numerous marriages during his tenure as a magistrate. He was an entrepreneur in a catering business, the first black-owned business in Seven Pines. Charles' hobbies were fishing, cooking, working in the yard, watching television and football games. Charles performed community service as a member of the Lions' Club and the Rotary Club. His volunteer work connected him with families in distress, in situations including Hurricane Isabel. He helped to repair and build homes with Habitat for Humanity. Youth in the community were able to enjoy exposure to social and sports events and to other cities due to Charles' contributions of transportation and tickets. Charles also worked with homeless shelters and helped the elderly. Recipients of food baskets, prepared meals and loving care benefited from this attention. He looked forward to family

gatherings, particularly during holidays, cooking and preparing for the family. He loved his entire family, his devoted brothers the Atkins, and friends from all over.
