Charlie never stopped working until "the job was done".

Charles left a positive and lasting impression on everyone that knew him. He was known for his passion and expertise of fine wine. He was also a self taught thoroughbred racing handicapper. Many a friend and fellow employee was known to seek advice from Charles on either subject. Charles also put his accounting background to use every spring , as a tax preparer/specialist.
