



## Charles Randolph Owens

August 24, 1921 - June 11, 2006

CHARLES RANDOLPH OWENS, JR. was the only child of Lena Collins Owens and Charles Randolph Owens, Sr. Mrs. Hattie Grant, a foster mother, was instrumental in his upbringing. A product of the Baltimore City Public School System, Charles was a graduate of Frederick Douglass High School and Morgan State College. In 1956, he married Jean Batts, a union which spanned fifty years. Charles served in the United States Army Air Force and was trained at Tuskegee; Biloxi, Mississippi; Suffolk Field, Michigan and Lackland, Texas and was a member of the 302 Bombardment Group. Following his tour of duty with the Army, he enrolled at Morgan State College and began working for the Veterans Bureau. His career with the federal government spanned forty-five years during which he worked at Aberdeen Proving Ground as a Civilian Instructor, at the Army Intelligence School at Fort Holabird and ended his career as a Public Relations Specialist with the Health Care Finance Administration. He was cited for his services on the Indo-China Resettlement Task Force, an assignment that required him to visit sites to which Vietnamese refugees were assigned throughout the contiguous United States and the Virgin Islands. Charles loved to interact with others and was a member of the Capitol Hill Toastmasters, The Khayamites, and Big Brothers. He served as a Sunday School Teacher and a member of the Deacons Board of Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church. His illness was an extended one. Now, he finds peace and all is hopefully well with his soul. In addition to his wife Jean, he is survived by: two daughters, Yvonne Owens Jones and Cheryl

Owens Robinson; two sons-in-law, Charles E. Robinson and Earl Jones, Jr.; seven grandchildren, Christine, Crystal and Cherisse Robinson and Earl III, Eryn, Elan, and Evan Jones; a sister-in-law, Lavinia Green; two nieces, Donna Murray and Lisa Gould; four nephews, Lenny and Raymond Green, William Murray (Donna) and Byron Gould (Lisa); a great-niece, Shania Green; and a host of cousins and friends.
