CHRISTINE ELIZABETH BROOKS, daughter of James William Hunter and Irene Hunter, was born on February 19, 1929 in Ranlo, North Carolina. She departed this life on Sunday, January 29, 2006 due to cancer. After graduating from Highland High School in Gastonia, North Carolina in 1949, Christine went to live with her aunt, Annie Louise Hunter in Canton, Ohio. Later she moved to Baltimore, Maryland and lived with her cousin. At the age of twenty-five, Christine met and married Joseph Milton Brooks of Baltimore, Maryland, and out of this union five children were born. Christine owned and operated Brooks Quality Hand Caning Co. where she did intricate caning work for a host of individuals and businesses including Walters Art Gallery, Baltimore Museum of Art and Sotheby's Auction House, for nearly thirty years. Her excellent work was always well spoken of. The safety and cleanliness of her neighborhood was very important to Christine. She organized community clean-ups and actively helped to prevent drug activity in her neighborhood. She was the former president of the Pimlico Community Action Association speaking with councilpersons, congressmen and mayors about the plight of the Pimlico community. Christine kept a beautiful home and garden where family, friends and customers admired her furnishings. She loved the Lord dearly, reading God's word daily, sharing the word of God and living a life representative of Christ. She is survived by her loving husband of fifty-two years, Joseph Milton Brooks, Sr., a retired MTA employee; three sons, Joseph Milton Brooks, Jr. of Lochearn, David A. Brooks of Charlottesville, VA and Paul

L. Brooks of Pikesville; a daughter, Carolyn R. Banks of Ellicott City; five grandchildren, one son-in-law, one daughter-in-law, and a host of family and friends. Their oldest daughter, Jeanne Marie Brooks, preceded her mother in death in 2003.
