Reflections

Dorothy King Yates lived a long, beautiful life of service. Though many knew her, they may enjoy knowing more. At 92, Dorothea still made her breakfast and her bed. She read her Bible every day and turned off the news opting for Family Feud. The "Most Popular Girl" and "May Queen" in Armstrong High School's 1941 graduating class had three favorite colors: pink, blue, and beige. She wrote poems, liked to draw, and had an exquisite singing voice.

Dorothea was a 37-year, 5th grade teacher who saw every child as capable and visited parents after school to tell them so. She was first recipient of Blackwell Elementary's Teacher Of the Year award in 1975 and was affectionately called, "the teacher's teacher." Known for originating Class On Wheels, Dorothea retired from Richmond Public Schools in 1984.

Dorothea adored her family: Mama (Emma), grandparents, parents, aunts, uncles, cousins, and in-laws. She filled her home with music and made potato salad to rival any serious chef. She was a sun-up-to-sun-down gardener with fig, apple, and cherry trees in her Montrose Avenue backyard.

Dorothea belonged to Ebenezer Baptist Church 80+ years; she was a Girl Scout there, sang in the choir, and later volunteered as Co-Chairperson for its

food bank. She baked mackerel on Sunday mornings, and liked her seat in the church balcony. She drove a car because she had to and more than anything, Dorothea loved her husband, Carl, her daughter, Diane, her grandsons, Carl and G, and her eight great-grand children.

She only cared about how you were being NOW. My Mother believed in her Bible; at 92 years of age, she read it every day, and lived what she believed until her death on Wednesday, October 18, 2017.

For those of you who THOUGHT you knew her, let me tell you that she was so much more. She lost her Mama who reared her (Emma) and her husband (Carl) in the same month. Double-hit and grief-stricken, she persevered and continued on. A strong woman of God who believed in her savior, Jesus Christ, my Mother referenced the Bible each and EVERY time there was a family crisis. She taught me to hold onto God's unchanging hand and to trust in His mercy.

She loved her family beyond measure - especially those aunts Lucille, Gullnare, Thelma, Hortense, Gladys, and Marie who reared her. She loved her ancestors and in-laws. Her mother-in-law, Ruth Yates said, "Dorothea is a daughter to me and I love her." My Mother could cook up a home-cooked meal any time of the day or night (just like Emma) to make anyone question what GOOD cooking was. (Just ask anyone about her potato salad, ok?)

I watched my Mother open brown paper packages from Horace Ashe of new meat and prepare gravy to lift it. I listened as she consoled Rev. Howard Chubbs when he faced his death. I watched and listened to her as she gave all she had to comfort and console the weak and scared. As a child, I moved out of my bed and gave up my clothes when my Mother knew someone in need. She would

say to me, "This is what we have to do." My Mother was a God-gift and I gratefully acknowledge that.

Dorothea K. Yates was a gift from Almighty God and I am honored to be her only child.

Thank you all for your kind expressions of sympathy and condolence. May her memory be with us forever and may she continue to inspire the best we have to give.
