Earl worked for five years before serving in the United States Armed Forces. He was in the 66th A Battalion and he was honorably discharged .

Prior to his military service, Earl was employed as as a sheet list clerk at the Lutherville Lumber Company on Railroad Avenue in Lutherville, Maryland. He was employed by United States Postal Service for forty years. He worked in many positions during his employment at the USPS.

When he retired, he was a Transportation Supervisor.

In his spare time, Earl enjoyed seeing horse racing, playing cards and hanging out at Andy's. He played baseball for the Lutherville athletic Club. He absolutely loved the Orioles. He was their biggest fan whether they were winning or losing. This was a good year for Youngie's Orioles.

His favorite son was "Let's Get It On" by Marvin Gaye.

In 1961, he married his longtime love, Virginia Williams. From this union four children were born. Mary Ann McManus, Earl's eldest daughter was born from a previous marriage. She was his primary caregiver for the last two years.

He was preceded in death by his son, Earl Louis Frazier and his wife, Virginia T. Young (Ginny).
