ERNEST W. NUNNALLY SR., son of the late Alfonso and Verniece Nunnally, was born on August 25, 1921 in Fort Mitchell, Virginia. He departed this life on June 28, 2006. Ernest loved and trusted the Lord and at an early age gave his life to Christ. He was a faithful member of the Ebenezer Baptist Church and later Greater Gethsemane Missionary Baptist. He received his public school education in Virginia and New York and then obtained employment with the Bethlehem Steel Company. On October 18, 1942, Ernest married Ethel May Anderson. This union was blessed with five children. Ernest was a true patriarch, lovingly and carefully guiding his family and instilling values that he had learned from his parents. Ernest served his country during World War II. He often recalled his miraculous rescue after his ship had been torpedoed. He and several other soldiers spent two days in the shark infested water of the Pacific Ocean before being rescued by another ship that spotted their makeshift raft. After being honorably discharged in 1946, Ernest returned to work at the Bethlehem Steel Mill in Sparrows Point, Maryland. He retired in May 1983, after working for more than forty years. His late wife, Ethel, was devoted to him and they shared a wonderful marriage of fifty-two years. Ernest leaves to cherish his memory: three daughters, Mildred, Vernice and Kim; two sons, Daniel Sr. and Ernest Jr.; three sons-in-law, Donald Wade, Tyrone Barnard and Rupert Williams; one brother, Warren Nunnally; one sister, Marion Mitchell; three sisters-in-law, Annie Thomas, Doris Anderson and Catherine Anderson; five grandchildren, Tracey Curtis, Lisa Hawkes,

Kevin Jones Sr., Daniel Nunnally Jr. and Katrice Nunnally; two grandsons-in-law, Kevin Curtis and Darrell Hawkes; one granddaughter-in-law, Dionne Jones; seven great-grandchildren, Sean, Kenneth, Jerrell, Nicole, Monique, Brianne and Kevin Jr.; one granddaughter-in-love, Kira; and a host of loving nieces, nephews, and other relatives and friends.
