Ethel held various jobs working in packing houses, the school system and some domestic work also. She retired from St. Patrick's Church where she cooked for the priest and nuns of the church. The church would see that she received The Upper Room and Our Daily Bread, which she read faithfully each day. Ethel truly loved her family. In the early years there was not one of the many babies in the family that didn't get the special attention with her "famous song." It had no rhythm or rhyme. Just "de da de da dedadee." Just a little song she'd sing while she rocked. She always inquired "How's the family?" wanting to know about everybody. There was nothing Ethel would not do for anyone. She was always, asking "Do you need anything?" Ethel was a

member of the Purity/Sweet Beulahland Chapter #7/29 of Benevolent Protective Order of Reindeer, Inc and Zorah Elliott Temple #717.
