August 26, 1926 - March 10, 2013

On Saturday, March 9th the Lord called Georgette Boykin home. She was born January 27, 1931 at Johns Hopkins Hospital to Charles and Bessie White-Hall. She was the younger of two daughters. Georgette was educated in the Baltimore City School System. In June 1952, Georgette married Joseph T. Boykin Sr. They had five sons, Lonnie (Butch), Joseph Jr., Wayne, Gary (Mike) and Kenneth (Kenny). For many years, Georgette was employed at the old Sinai Hospital, formerly located across the street from Johns Hopkins Hospital.

Later, Georgette helped her husband establish their school bus business, Boykin's Transportation. They held the business until her late husband's death at which time their youngest son, Kenny, took over until his untimely death.

Georgette was extremely smart and valued education. However, life's circumstances didn't allow her the opportunity to finish school until later in life. Georgette made a vow to herself to return to school and further her education once her youngest son entered high school. First she attended Dunbar High to obtain her diploma, then earning an A A degree in Medical Recording from the Community College of Baltimore. Upon graduation, Georgette began working at University of Maryland Hospital in 1966, where she remained until her retirement on October 1, 1991.

Georgette enjoyed nothing more than traveling and family gatherings. She was also very fond of discussing medicine and politics. Many were surprised at how much she knew and how aware of the political arena she was. Georgette could talk for hours on either subject. Family members told her on more than one occasion, she should have been a nurse or doctor and maybe mayor of Baltimore.

Georgette had a wonderful sense of humor but was also a “no nonsense” kind of person. When she told you she was or wasn't going to do something, you could take it to the bank. Everyone who knew her would tell you Georgette was devoted wife, mother, sister, grandmother, great-grandmother, aunt and friend. If you needed her, she was there. She played different roles in the lives of many. All who have had the experience of her comfort and care will forever have an empty place in their hearts where she once resided. Georgette lost her fight with a short illness in the early hours of Saturday, March 9, 2013.

She leaves to mourn; her remaining sons Lonnie, Joseph, Jr., and Gary one daughter-in-law Jeannie, five grandchildren, eight great-grandchildren, a host of nieces, nephews and friends.
