She enjoyed writing letters to all her family and friends. She also taught Bible study to the residents and would visit them in their rooms. She loves going to all her favorite activities, including bowling, bingo, church, and her favorite, singing. She makes everyone's day with her big beautiful smile and the sound of her singing.
