Jannie worked as a domestic engineer, beautician as well as a certified missionary and foster parent. She was famous for her chocolate, coconut and pineapple cakes. She continued to be a loving mother to her children, and in her spare time she operated in many ministries which included taking care of the sick and shut-in and singing for the Lord which led her to sing with the Holy Echoes, Gospel Determinairs and The Stromean Singers. While singing she met her late husband Aaron Lyon. Jannie Lyon joined Charity Baptist Church in 1965. She later joined her brother's church, Our Lord's Pentecostal Church, which relocated. Jannie then joined First Saint Stephen's Baptist Church, where she joined the Season Saints Choir, until the Lord called her home. 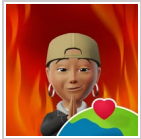
