JOSEPHINE MILLER (nee Wilson), daughter of the late Colonel and Addie Wilson and loving wife of the late James Miller, Jr., was born January third, 1932 in Marion, South Carolina. She was called to eternal rest on March fourth, 2010 after an extensive stay in Manor Care Nursing Home in Towson, Maryland. Josephine received her education in the public school system of Marion County. After her 1948 marriage to James Miller Jr., she and James moved to Baltimore, Maryland where they raised their family of ten children (four daughters and six sons). The majority of Josephine's adulthood was spent as homemaker for her husband and large family. She did, however, work periodically; first at Village Carry Out Restaurant and later at Union Memorial Hospital. Josephine was most excited by her Christian missionary work at Solid Rock Church which was renamed River of Life Church. Most notable in her missionary work was a mid-nineteen eighties trip to Port-au-Prince, Haiti. In her later years, Josephine's missionary work involved many visits to local prison facilities. Josephine is survived by four generations: six sons, James, III (Velma), Larry (Arlene), Terry (Robin) of Stone Mountain, Georgia, Joseph, Mario (Veronica) of Fayetteville, North Carolina and Charles of Hagerstown, Maryland; two daughters, Shelia and Cathy (Oladeto). Her two other daughters, Geraldine and Jacqueline, preceded her in death. She is also survived by: one brother, Frank Wilson and four sisters, Charlotte Williams, Doris Williamson, Betty Jean Williamson, all of Marion, South Carolina and Janilee Legette of Raines, South Carolina; twenty-five grandchildren,

seventeen great-grandchildren, four great-great-grandchildren and a host of nieces, nephews, cousins and friends.
