Joyce received her education in the Richmond Public Schools and was graduated from Maggie L. Walker High School in 1976. She was baptized at 31st Street Baptist Church in 1983. Joyce retired from the City of Richmond Department of Social Services after 31 years of service. She joined the Medical Records staff at MCV in October 2006. Forever seeking just "\$2", Joyce also worked part-time for many years at the Richmond Coliseum and the Landmark Theatre.

Although it seemed that Joyce was continuously working, she made time for the four loves in her life; daily walks with Iris her best friend from childhood,
