



## Julia M. Nicholson-McIntosh

January 29, 1930 - May 23, 2007

Julia Nicholson McIntosh went home to glory on Wednesday, May 23, 2007 after a very long illness. Julie McIntosh was born on January 29, 1930 to the late William and Thelma Nicholson and was married to the late Charles O. McIntosh Sr. Julia McIntosh was a hard working focused individual all of her life. Educated in the Baltimore City Public School System, Mrs. McIntosh graduated from Paul Lawrence Dunbar High School. Julia N. McIntosh was a private person and she enjoyed “a good cup of tea”. While an under grad at Morgan State College, Mrs. McIntosh became an active member of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority. It was no surprise to those who knew her well that she had a particular love for the reading of literature and that she would go on to graduate from Morgan State College with a Bachelor’s Degree in English, Thereafter, she briefly taught for the Baltimore County Public School System. As an English teacher for the Baltimore City Public School System, Mrs. McIntosh’s postgraduate studies were at Loyola University. Mrs. McIntosh went on to complete a Master’s Degree in Special Education. She was one of the first women to do so. With continued graduate work at Loyola, Julia N. McIntosh earned a C.A.S.E.; then a specialist in Special Education, Mrs. McIntosh continued to teach English for the Baltimore City Public School System, and for 10 concurrent years, she also taught English at Morgan State University. After a combined 25 years as a devoted educator to both children and adults, Mrs. McIntosh retired and briefly taught part-time for a GED program. In her later, more personal, year’s mysteries become her favorite

form of literature with which to relax. Mrs. Julia Nicholson McIntosh will always be loved and remembered by one daughter, Dr. Melvina G. Roy, Ph.D. of Maryland and one son, Mr. Kenneth A. McIntosh, of Florida, four sisters, Mrs. Myrtle McCullers, Mrs. Ida Hawkins, Mrs. Thelma Gross, Mrs. Ramona Harmon and one brother, Mr. LeRoy Nicholson, two granddaughters, Regina Warren and Desire'e Robinson, and four great-grandchildren of Maryland, as well as many other nieces, nephews, relatives, friends, and colleagues.
