July 22, 1900 - July 28, 2004

On July 28, 2004, Lillian Driver Brooks Merritt slipped peacefully away at the age of 104, where she was a resident for 14 years, at the Keswick Multicare Nursing Center in Baltimore, Maryland. Lillian was born the daughter of the late Maryous and Mary Driver in Gloucester County, VA., on July 22, 1900. The family later moved to Essex, MD in 1912. She had to drop out of school in the eighth grade in order to help care for her eight younger brothers and sisters. Lillian's religious life began at an early age at St. Stevens Ave Church in Essex, MD. There she played piano and taught Sunday school. Later in her adult life she joined Enon Baptist Church in Baltimore, where she received a plaque for 50 years of dedicated service in 1987. Even at her age she would still give praise to God, openly pray, and sing hymns. Her career included the jobs of seamstress and domestic work. She retired as a factory worker. Lillian's hobbies included crocheting, knitting, playing board games and taking care of her pets. She enjoyed watching soap operas, listening to Orioles baseball games, and listened to religious radio stations. Lillian was first united in marriage to the late Benjamin Brooks. This union was blessed with two sons; the late Benjamin C. Brooks and Melvin O. Brooks of Baltimore. Later, she had a 40-year marriage to Bernard Merritt before he departed in 1980. Lillian was preceded in death by one son, Benjamin C. Brooks, one granddaughter, Lillian Lansbury, four brothers and three sisters all of Baltimore. She leaves to cherish her memories, a loving son, Melvin Otho Brooks of Baltimore, a daughter-in-law, Ruth Brooks of Baltimore, two devoted

grand daughters, Bernice Brooks-Plymouth of Randallstown, Esther Rose Danner of Bowie; a brother, Raymond Driver of Baltimore; two sisters-in-law, Helen Driver and Margaret Driver of Baltimore; four great grandsons, Phillip and Paul Plymouth of Randallstown; Lester Danner Jr., of Bowie and Michael James of Cambridge, MD, and a host of relatives and friends.
