"Lillie," as she was affectionately known to friends and family, attended Baltimore City Public Schools. She worked as a housekeeper for Goucher College for several years. She worked as a seamstress at the French Shop. She was also employed at Glenn L. Martin during World War II. She retired from Hutzler's Department Store as a seamstress. As a teenager, she met and married John Lightfoot, Sr. and from this union three children were born, John Lightfoot, Jr., Doris Payne and Vernon Lightfoot, all of whom preceded her in death.
