Linwood remained a loyal and trusted employee of United until his retirement in 1997. He enjoyed traveling with his wife, shooting pool, dancing with his nieces and granddaughters and attending social gatherings

with friends and relatives. Linwood always had a love for horticulture; which showed in the 30-year transformation of the landscape of the home he shared with his wife Sarah. Linwood could always be found outside pruning trees, planting flowers, cutting grass and “moving earth”. His daughters always wondered why he would move dirt from one side of the yard to the other. They have since found out first hand the reason...gardening is soothing to the soul. “Lenny” was also a valued friend with strong relationships that spanned decades. The recipients of his love and friendship were fortunate to have him in their lives. Linwood C. Nobles departed this life and joined his late brother Christopher Nobles on November 20, 2009.
