“I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I kept the faith” Luther Tyler, son of the late Grant and Ester Tyler, departed this life on August 25, 2002 while hospitalized at the Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center. Born on August 25, 1924 in Goochland County, Virginia, he was one of seventeen children of which eight survives. He attended the public schools of Goochland County. Luther accepted Christ at a very early age and was baptized at Ebenezer Baptist Church. During these early years at home, he was a devoted grandchild who helped to care for his ailing grandmother. Luther was inducted into the U.S. Army in the early forties during World War II where he later received an honorable discharge. Upon discharge from the Army, he became a member of the American Legion Northeastern Post 285 which he loved dearly. He was a very devoted member, receiving many awards and served as the Commander and Chairman of the Executive Board. After his stay in the Army, Luther moved to Baltimore, Maryland in the mid forties. Bethlehem Steel Co. employed him where he worked until he retired on disability in April of 1983. On May 21, 1959, he was joined in holy matrimony with Linda Wright. They enjoyed 43 years of marital bliss. A very jovial and happy person, Luther had a nickname for many of his family members, friends and co-workers. His most enjoyable moments were spent in conversations with family and friends where he was always a major part of the discussion. Whenever he was present, we looked forward to him entertaining us with his jokes followed by his hearty laughter. After his retirement, he spent many

hours watching his favorite soap operas and baseball games. Luther loved his family and had a very special bond with his oldest sister Louise.
