MRS. MABLE CLARA COPELAND, wife of Mr. Arthur C. Grigsby, daughter of the late Mr. Vanderbilt Copeland and the late Mrs. Savannah West Copeland, was born in Embro, Warren County, North Carolina on January 13, 1932. She was called to rest on February 14, 2011 while in Good Samaritan Hospital in Baltimore, Maryland.

She accepted Jesus Christ as her Savior at an early age while attending Lovely Hill Baptist Church in her childhood home. In Baltimore, for many years she was a member of Fairfield Baptist Church. Years later she attended St. Paul Baptist Church before becoming a founding member of Mt. Tabor Baptist Church. In addition, for many years she attended the women's Saturday Sunday School classes at Huber Memorial Church. When the LORD called her home, she was a faithful and active member of Grace Memorial Baptist Church. She had taught adult Sunday School classes, and was a member of the Golden Disciples Ministry. She loved attending and participating in adult Sunday School Classes. She was also extremely proud and honored to be a 199 graduate of the Baltimore School of the Bible.

She was educated in the Warren County Public School System of North Carolina. She attended John R. Hawkins High School. However she completed the twelfth grade and graduated from Rayen High School in Youngstown, Ohio.
