December 25, 1911 - April 22, 2016

One hundred and four years ago on Christmas day (1911), in Baltimore City; Mamie Elizabeth Marshall was born; the youngest of three daughters of John Herry and Mamie Elizabeth Marshall. She, along with her sisters, the late Irene Smith and Jessie Taylor, was educated in the City's public schools, and grew within her heritage of St. Lucia West Indies with her family. As a young girl, she stayed at the knee of her father (Pappy) and assisted him in his membership. She was confirmed in the Episcopal faith over 75 years ago and throughout her life worshiped at St James Episcopal Church. Following her graduation from Douglass High School, she attended Coppin Normal (now Coppin State University) where she received her Teacher's Certification. Upon receipt of her Certificate in 1931, Mamie Marshall returned to Baltimore City's School system to teach elementary school, and children with special needs. During this time, Mamie Marshall Kelly spent her summers and most of her weekends at

her home (named Kellmar), near Annapolis, Md., on the Severn River. There she entertained her family and friends. We all had a great time boating, fishing, crabbing and swimming. She enjoyed gardening, so fresh vegetables and fruits were served with the great meals.

She later earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Education from Furman State University. Then, Mamie Marshall Kelly attended New York University, where she received her Master's degree in Education. She would tell stories of how much fun she and her classmates would have while traveling on the train to and from New York City, while she pursued her degree. When not teaching, she loved spending summers in NJ, with family and friends.

She was joined in marriage to William "Billy" Lee. The two traveled and socialized with family and friends, as their home was full of fun and laughter. They were inseparable until Billy's passing.

As an active member of St James Episcopal Church, Mamie worked with the Alter Guild, sang in the Rose Choir and was a lifetime member of St Martha's Guild. After 40 years of teaching, Mamie retired. She then began her second career as a dental assistant. Mamie continued to work, until well in her eighties. Also, she worked as a volunteer in the gift shop at Bowman Gray Hospital, and was proudly involved in
