



Marsh Lee Jones

October 21, 1926 - August 7, 2004

Marsh Lee Jones, son of the late Howard and Elizabeth Adams-Jones, was born in New Windsor on October 21, 1926. He departed this life after a lengthy illness on August 7, 2004, at Manor Care nursing home in Ruxton. Marsh received his education in Westminister, Maryland where he attended the Robert Morton high school until entering the armed services. The call to duty led Marsh to enlist into the United States Navy on October 8, 1943 until May 4, 1946. During his three-year enlistment, he was assigned to a Minesweeper stationed off of the coast of South America and had engaged in active combat during World War II. Later, he received an honorable discharge from the Navy. Marsh married Cornelia A. Jones on June 8, 1946 and they resided in Baltimore, Maryland. From this union, three children were born, Candy (Dec.), Tony and Michelle. Cornelia preceded him in death, in 2002. The Western Electric Company prior to his employment with the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company employed Marsh, where he was proud of being one of the first black linemen hired in the state of Maryland. He continued his long career with Bell-Atlantic as a lead systems technician for corporate clients, such as Pimlico Racetrack. As a technician, Marsh set up the communication link ups for television broadcasts, of the Preakness, for several years. Following thirty-five years in telecommunication services, Marsh retired. The Maryland Racetrack recognized Marsh's expertise and retained his services for ten years at Pimlico and Laurel RaceCourse, until his retirement in 1994. Marsh leaves to mourn his surviving

children, Tony A. Jones and Michelle C. Abrams; son-in-law, Raymond E. Abrams; grandchildren, Maurice Warren Hart and Rachelle C. Abrams; granddaughter-in-law, Kadija Hart; brothers, Joseph Hones and Howard Monroe Jones; sister, Elizabeth (Betty) Brown; brothers-in-law, Joseph and Andre Breckenridge; devoted friend, Dorothy Elaine Cook; and a host of nieces, nephews, cousins and friends.
