Mother Johnson (as we called her) would ask them to sing. They were called The Felder Sisters in Christ Temple Baptist Church. Singing, reading the Bible and listening to Gospel music is what Mary loved to do. When there was a song they wanted to learn the words to, they would buy the record and ask Emma to play the record over and over again to get the words down on paper for them to learn. The specialty for Mother Johnson to ask The Felder Sisters to sing is "Peace Be Still." After the passing of Mother Johnson they soon joined The Unity Teaching. Mary will be missed by her family. She leaves to mourn: her two sisters, Bertha Kearney and Julia Bumbrey; nieces, Emma, Arlene, Dale, Lisa, Juliette and Diane; nephews, Louis and Kirk; five grand-nieces, nine grand-nephews, four great-grand-nieces, six great-grand-nephews, three great-

great-grand-nieces, a great-great-grand-nephew; four nieces-in-law, three nephews-in-law, and a host of other family members. She also had one brother, Charles Felder; niece, Gladys; nephew, James; two great-nephews, Efrem and Jules; and four sisters who all passed on before her.
