On Saturday, January 31, 2004 about 9:30 p.m., the death angel took the life of our beloved mother, Mrs. Mildred Harris at the Charles Village-Future Care Nursing Home. She was the daughter of the late Joseph and Mary Lucy Stephen. She was born in Halifax County, Virginia on August 21, 1921. She joined the Greater Brandon Chapel Baptist Church at an early age. She married her army sweetheart, the late George Moses Harris. To that union, three daughters were born. In 1952, the family moved to Baltimore, Maryland where they joined Zion Baptist Church. She was a domestic worker until a surgery prevented her return to that profession. Nevertheless, her skills as a seamstress enabled her to provide necessities. Later in 1966, the Harris moved to Aisquith Street where she found a new church as much as possible even if she had to go alone. Never was she too tired to sew an outfit or bake and extra pie or bread for numerous anniversary programs. Every item she contributed to the church was in demand. Mom Mildred, as we all called her, had an extended family in St. John and the Community. She was a giver and had a huge heart for all mankind. If she had a spare coat, dress or pan, you could have it. If you were sick, in pain, or hungry, she had the remedy. Most importantly, she loved and encouraged the whole family to forgive, unite and get closer together. Every sister, brother, nephew or niece has had some advice from this woman about family and life, because she lived it each day

unconditionally.
