Monwilla, affectionately known as "Snooks", was educated in the Baltimore Public School System. Just out of high school, she qualified for employment with the Maryland State Department. However, she was too young to be employed. At the age of eighteen, she was employed in the clerical position and rose through the ranks. "Monty," which she was called on job, remained there for thirty years until she became disabled. She retired as "Interstate Coordinator of Unemployment Insurance." She was the first black to hold that position. Monwilla received her early Christian training at home. Zion has always been her church home. She was baptized by Zion's founder, Rev. Matthew W. Wilkerson, at the age of six. Of course, Sunday School, BTU and mostly all services were a must for Snooks. Monwilla sang alto with with the Children's Choir, Youth Choir and the Senior Choir. Her melodious voice could be heard over the other voices. Monwilla also volunteered with the senior citizens. She was past president and an ardent disciple the Silver/Golden Agers. Monwilla was her mother's caregiver for many years. She was ever loving, kind and thoughtful. When she went on vacation, her friends willingly cared for her mother. Snooks was married to the late Eddie Gibson.
