August 9, 1949 - February 29, 2008

On August 9, 1949, NATHANIEL EUGENE CARTER was born to the Frank B. Carter and Elizabeth Carter, in Richmond, Virginia. On Friday, February 29, 2008, he departed this life suddenly. Nathaniel was brought to Baltimore, Maryland at a young age, where he attended the Baltimore City public schools. He was the first born of nine children. In 1969, he enlisted in the United States Army. He served a Vietnam Combat Soldier from 1969-1971, where he served his country proudly. After returning from the Vietnam War, he worked as a cement finisher with his uncle and attended the Baltimore City Community College for a period of time. Nathaniel throughout the years always kept the traditions of the military by waking up early in the morning, getting dressed and being on time for appointments. He also wore his medals of honor and pants "bloused" (tucked) in his boots. He helped care for his nieces and nephews and was always a giver to them and to his sisters and brothers. Nathaniel leaves to cherish his memory: five brothers, George Carter, Daniel Carter, Sodiel Ben Yehudah, William W. Carter and Irvin Carter; two sisters, Betty E. King and Patty Q. Carter; brother-in-law, Ronald J. King; two sisters-in-law Leah Yehudah and Shelia Carter; three aunts, Louise Broady, Ruth Broady-Smith and Margaret N. Meade all from Richmond, Virginia; uncle, Robert Broady Jr. and aunt-in-law, Emma Jean Broady both from Rockingham, North Carolina. He also leaves twenty-three nieces and nephews, twenty-eight great-nieces and nephews along with a host of cousins, other relatives and friends.
