NATHANIEL JULIUS JOHNSON was born on October 7, 1922, in Baltimore, Maryland and departed this life on July 24, 2005, after a brief illness. He was the son of the late Sadie Johnson Sadler and the late Andrew Young, Sr. "Nat" was married to the late Hattie King Johnson for many years. Prior to this marriage he was married to Ruth Virginia Butler Johnson. "Nat," as he was affectionately called, was a World War II Army Veteran. He was raised and educated in Towson, Maryland and attended Mt. Calvary A. M. E. Church as a youngster. He loved horses and the race track. Nat was a small man and in his younger years was a Jockey riding steeple chase races at Pimlico and Timonium race tracks. Later, he bred and trained horses and transported them along the East Coast. Eventually he purchased a race horse of his own. Nat retired from Pimlico Race track at the age of seventy-four. He continued to transport horses out of state until his illness at the age of eighty-one. Nat's father Andrew retired from Pimlico at the age of ninety. He is survived by his sister, Doris Jackson; four daughters, Justine Johnson Chase, Sadie Johnson Goldring, Ruth Johnson and Joanne Johnson; two stepbrothers, Keith Young of Korea and Andrew Young, Jr. of Martinsburg, West Virginia; two sons-in-law, Thomas Chase and Richard Goldring; eighteen grandchildren, great grandchildren; and a host of relatives and friends.
