ELDER PERRY J. FANCHER, JR., was the second oldest child of the late Mary Vornon Fancher and Perry J. Fancher, Sr. Natives of Callery, Alabama, and the Fanchers moved with their young children to Vandergriff, Pennsylvania where Elder Fancher attended school. As a young man, Elder Fancher joined the Navy during World War II. Following his tour of duty, Elder Fancher moved to New York City. There, he was employed as a chef in one of the city's largest hotels. After some years, he moved to Baltimore where he fellowshiped in the church pastured by his brother, the late Bishop Ivery Fancher. Elder Fancher was a particularly gifted man and did many things well. His culinary talents were well known, as was his mastery of mechanics. He loved being around young people and eventually took a position with the Baltimore City Public School System as a Stationary Engineer. Elder Fancher loved The Lord and would give testimony of God's goodness to all that would listen. After a year-long illness, Elder Fancher's final few earthly days were spent in peace at The Gilchrist Center in Towson, Maryland. It was from there that he went home to be with The Lord on Wednesday, May 17, 2006. His wife Helen and their two daughters and one son, four brothers, and four sisters preceded him in death. Elder Fancher leaves behind to cherish his memory his eldest son Perry Fancher, III of Dudley, N.C., and his daughter-in-law Tina; their children, Heidi Fancher, Tonya Goodman and Sheila Hagans of Washington, D.C., and Larry Hagans of Dudley, N.C. He is also survived by his youngest son, Kirk Fancher of Baltimore, Maryland; his wife Cathryn and

their daughter Rachel; Four brothers, Roland and Herbert of Dayton, Ohio, and Otis and Donald of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; and three sisters, Gertrude Hardman and Dora Ruffin of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and Vivian Longmire of Decatur, Georgia. He will also be missed by a precious host of sisters-in-law, brothers-in-law, nieces, nephews, cousins and friends.
