SHELTON F. CHASE, son of the late John and Annie Chase, was born on January 8, 1915 in Baltimore, Maryland. He departed this life on Thursday, September 4, 2008 after a short illness. He was educated in the Baltimore City Public School System. After leaving school he worked as an Elevator Operator until being drafted by the United States Army at the age of twenty-seven. He served as a Corporal in the Company A, 386th Engineering Battalion and fought during World War II battle in Naples and Rome, Italy. While serving in the military he received several awards such as the Good Conduct Medal, Meritorious Unit Award, European Service Ribbon, African Middle Eastern Service Ribbon, American Theater Service Ribbon and the World War II Victory Ribbon. He was honorably discharge November 6, 1945. Upon leaving the military, he was employed as a Motion Picture Operator at some of Baltimore's local movie theaters. After retiring from the movie theater, he began working part-time at the Bethesda United Methodist Church as a Maintenance Engineer. He was affectionately known as "Uncle Shelton" by family and friends and will be sincerely missed by everyone who knew him. He leaves to mourn and cherish his memory: two brothers, Herbert and Charles Chase; beloved niece, Jacqueline Trusty; two devoted nephews, Francis McLendon and Mike Trusty; other nieces, nephews, and a host of other relatives and friends.
