Sigmond Davis, son of the late Hosea Sr. and Easter Avie Davis, was born on July 8, 1922 in Kinston, North Carolina. He was the seventh of eleven children in the Davis family. He quietly departed this life on December 7, 2004 after a lengthy battle with Alzheimer's. Sigmond received his education in the Lenoir County Public school system in North Carolina. Sigmond answered his first call to soldier in 1935. He valiantly fought in World War II and returned home a decorated veteran, having received three bronze stars and a victory medal. Sigmond became saved as a young man and soon became an Elder in the Holiness Church. He left North Carolina and traveled to New York. He served as pastor of various churches in New York in 1960's, including Brooklyn Tabernacle and Holy Temple. While employed at West Point, he was introduced to Edna E. Lofton. Sigmond and Edna were married in October 1970. From this union they bore two children, Patrice Ines and Sigmond Earl. After retiring from West Point in June 1978, Sigmond moved his family to Baltimore. Sigmond loved the Lord, people and music. He made numerous friends wherever he went. Affectionately known as "Gabriel" because he "sure knew how to put a hurtin' on that slide horn", he also played the cymbals and would tinker around on the piano. He was an excellent carpenter and craftsman and took great delight in his work. Sigmond was a man of God, a true friend and devoted family man. He leaves to mourn his beloved wife, Edna E. Davis; son, Sigmond Earl Davis; daughter, Patrice Ines and son-in-law, Christopher Powell; two grandchildren, Chey Alastair Jordan and Elias Xavier

Powell; one sister, Avie Mae Jones, of North Carolina; three sisters-in-law, two brothers-in-law, nieces, nephews and a host of other beloved relatives and friends.
