Stanley Jerome Stern was the youngest of three children born on November 22, 1932 to the late Oliver Stern and Carrie Stern in Baltimore Maryland. After a short illness, the Lord sent an angel to escort him back to his true love who awaited him in their heavenly home. Stanley attended Dunbar High School where he played on the football team. He enjoyed participating in after school sports at Chick Webb Center. He met and married the late Mary Ann "Mickey" Oglesby in 1952. After joining the army in 1952, Stanley served in Korea for eighteen months, serving in his medic unit. After an honorable discharge, he returned to his employment at Johns Hopkins. His tenure continued at St. Joseph's Hospital on Caroline and Hoffman Streets in the accident room and Orthopedics Associates. From their union, Stanley and Mary were blessed with seven children. With a stern yet loving hand, he provided nurturing support for his family while working two jobs. The Sterns loved to travel with their family, particularly to drive-in-movies, New York, Washington DC and his beloved Disney World. Stanley's favorite pastimes were lifting wights, bingo and playing cards. His famous catch phrases were "Be Careful," "It's 10 o'clock, let's call it a night!", "I'm only a tourist, what do I know?", "Who's this when I'm calling there?" Preceding him was his brother Oliver; his mother, Carrie Blackwell; his wife, Mary; and one of his daughters, Sharon Holland. He leaves to cherish his memory four daughters, Shelia, Shirley, Sandra and Stanya, two sons Shelby and Sidney, one sister, Dolores Jenkins, one sister-in-law, Dorothy Wood-Stern, one brother-in-law Rickey Oglesby, 20
