He departed this life on Wednesday, August 30, 2006. Stewart received his education in the public schools of Baltimore, Maryland. After graduating he enlisted in the United States Army, where he served for four years and received an honorable discharge. His career allowed him to work many years as a construction worker until his retirement. He met and married Miss Delilah Lewis, and of this union they were blessed with two sons and three daughters, Patricia, Stewart Jr., Joan, John and Bonita; along with a host of grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Stewart had a wonderful sense of humor and was gifted with keen insight, which he used ministering to others.
