September 27, 1940 - October 23, 2001

Sunday Ogbonna Anozie, son of Nathaniel Anozie Amadi and Margaret Adure Anozie, was born on September 27, 1942 in Owerri, Nigeria. He departed this life on October 24, 2001 in the Intensive care Unit of Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, Maryland. Sunday began his academic career at Holy Ghost College, Owerri. He received his Bachelor of Arts Degree at the University of Nigeria, Nsukka. Then Sunday traveled to Europe where he studied at Cambridge. Finally, with “Tres Honourable” mention, he received his doctorate from the Sorbonne. His life of teaching has spanned both the United States and Nigeria. His positions include Assistant Professor, University of Texas at Austin and State University of New York at New Paltz; Visiting Professor at the State University of New York at Buffalo; Professor of Comparative Literature at the University of Port Harcourt, Nigeria; Department of English Faculty at Morgan State University; and Adjunct Faculty in the Department of English at Towson University. Besides his university teaching, Sunday has written prolifically in the areas of literary sociology, comparative literature, and literary criticism. His books include *Sociologie du Roman Africain*, *Christopher Okigbo*, *Language Systems in Africa*, *Structural Models and African Poetics*. He is the founder, editor, and publisher of *The Conch*, *The Conch Review of Books*, *Conch Magazine, Ltd.*, and *Trado-Medic Books*. Respectfully called “The Roland Barthes of Sub-Saharan Africa” by Henry Louis Gates of Harvard University, Sunday remained always humble, in his intellectual as well as personal achievements. Sunday married the former Lynda Suzanne Hielscher,

and out of this union three children were born: Mary-Margaret Ada, Emily Chinyere, and Nathaniel Ogbonna. Besides his wife and children, Sunday is mourned by his mother Margaret, his brothers, Emmanuel and Richard; his sisters, Charity and Evelyn, his in-laws, Chinwe Iloabachie Anozie, Venerable G.N. Nweke, Barbara Minami, Lt. Col. Dalton Hielscher, nieces and nephews in Nigeria, Canada, California and New York; and a host of other relatives and friends throughout the world.
