



Thomas Cornelius Jackson

December 21, 1929 - November 26, 2005

THOMAS CORNELIUS JACKSON was born December 21, 1929 in Petersburg, Virginia. He was one of five children born to the late Ethel and Charles Jackson. Thomas accepted Christ at an early age at Mt. Olivet Baptist Church in Petersburg, Virginia. He was educated in the Petersburg Public School system, where he attended Peabody High School. He served in the military from 1947 to 1977 and fought in both the Korean and the Vietnam Wars. For his heroism, he received the Purple Heart Medal, four Bronze Stars, Army Commendation Medal, Good Conduct Medal, four Korean and Vietnam Service Medals, Combat Infantry Badge, Expert Infantry Badge, United Nations Service Medal, Republic of Vietnam Campaign Ribbon, Sharp Shooter Badge with Rifle Bar, Marksman Badge with Carbine Bar, Parachutist Badge, and National Defense Service Medals, and for this he received an honorable discharge. While in the United States army, he received his associate degree. After returning from the military, he attended J. Sargent Reynolds. Thomas also retired from the United States Postal Service. He became a community activist who spoke before the general assembly, the school board and many senators, as well as before other community leaders. He was also active in the Autism Society and happily dedicated much of his time with his son P.J. He is survived by his devoted and loving wife of 20 years, Mattie Arrington Jackson; two daughters, Sharon (Milton) Jackson Allen of Alabama, and Angelique Jackson of Richmond, Virginia; two sons, Raymond (Regina) Jackson of North Carolina, and Pharoah "P.J." Jackson of Richmond,

Virginia; three grandchildren, Ravon C., Ryan N. and Mattie L. Jackson; sister, Ellen Ferrell of Petersburg, Virginia; devoted niece, Amelia Jackson of Alexandria, Virginia; sisters-in-law, one devoted Shirley Arrington, Carrie Terrance, Ann Chiles, Melody A. Allen, Rose A. Wood, Joyce A. Faison, Joanne Arrington, Gwendolyn A. Stubbs, Nancy H. Orie and Demetrice Arrington; brothers-in-law, Dr. Alphonso Arrington, Jerry Faison, James A. Arrington, Elizah Stubbs, Michael B. Arrington and David Orie; and a host of other relatives and friends.
