Her love of music started early in her life when her father brought her first instrument, the trombone. She also learned to play the piano. She attended Douglass High School in Baltimore City and Morgan State College where she played trombone in the various marching, concert and jazz bands. After leaving Morgan State College, she worked as a teacher for the Baltimore City Public Schools in the area of music. As a devoted mother she also worked various jobs to support her sons through public and private schools and later sacrificing to put one son through college. As a devoted Christian, her love for music led her to volunteer at various Seventh-day Adventist churches in the Baltimore area as a pianist and organist for more than thirty-three years. She always said that God blessed her with this talent and long as she lived, she would share this gift of music with others. She shared her talent up until the day before she departed this life by playing for a group of people at the hospital. She married the love of her life, the late Gareth Chansford Taylor I, in 1957. From this union came two sons, Gareth II and Glen. After Gareth I passed, she courageously began raising two young sons on her own. Some years later she married the late Carlton S. Brown. One son, Gareth Taylor II, preceded her in death. Vernal was also preceded in death by four sisters Bertha Trent, Genevieve Gale, Julia Trent, and Evelyn Moses.
