



Walter H. Maddox

August 11, 1919 - August 25, 2002

On August 25, 2002, Walter Howard Maddox Sr. quietly departed this life after a long illness. Walter was born on August 11, 1919. He was the beloved son of the late Samuel and Katie Maddox. He was brought up in the Methodist Faith at a Samuel Wesley United Methodist Church; he later joined the New Life United Methodist Church in 1998. Walter was also a loyal member of the United Methodist Men. He was educated at the Princess Anne MD public school. After leaving school he enlisted into the United States Army on August 1, 1942, where he served in New Guinea for one year. He also went into the Philippines for one year. During his tour of duty, he received the Good Conduct Metal, American Theater Ribbon, Pacific Theater Ribbon and United of Award World II Victory Ribbon. After leaving the Army on January 3, 1946, he started working at Private Family Services, where he met and shortly thereafter married Georgia Mae Smith. From this 48-year union a son and two daughters were born. After leaving Private Family Services, he applied and was hired at the MTA, where he worked for 33 years until his retirement on June 1, 1983. He leaves to cherish his fond memories: one son, Walter H. Maddox Jr., his two daughters; Deborah D. Jackson and Barbara E. Boyd; one daughter-in-law, Jenny K.
