He entered the United States Navy at a young age and served as a Mess Officer until he retired with a medical discharge due to an injury. He greatly enjoyed telling stories about his foreign travels and experiences during his career in the Navy. He also kept his family’s attention when talking about Black history and his personal trials during those times. When he got dressed up, his favorite saying was “How do you like me now?” Truly, his presence will be sorely missed. He peacefully departed this life on Wednesday, March 24, 2004.
